Gathers twelve previously published science fiction short stories presents readers with a cast of wacky characters such as Ma McKenna, whose only friend is an alien stranded on Earth. All published poetry of James Baldwin, including six significant poems previously only available in a limited edition During his lifetime (1924–1987), James Baldwin authored seven novels, as well as

several plays and essay collections, which were published to widespread praise. These books, among them *Notes of a Native Son*, *Fire Next Time*, *Giovanni's Room*, and *Go Tell It on the Mountain*, brought him well-deserved acclaim as a public intellectual and admiration as a writer. However, Baldwin's earliest writing was in poetic form, and Baldwin considered himself a poet throughout his lifetime. Nonetheless, his single book of poetry, *Jimmy's Blues*, achieved the popularity of his novels and nonfiction, and is the only book to fall out of print. This new collection presents Baldwin the poet, including all nineteen poems from *Jimmy's Blues* as well as all the poems from a limited-edition volume called *Go Tell It on the Mountain* of which only 325 copies were ever printed and which was in production at the time of his death. Known for his relentless and startlingly prophetic insights on issues of race, gender, class, and poverty, Baldwin is just as enlightening and bold in his poetry as in his famous novels and essays. The poems range from the extended dramatic narratives of "Staggerlee wonders" and "Gypsy" to the lyrical beauty of "Some days," which has been set to music and interpreted by such acclaimed artists as Audra McDonald. Nikki Finney's introductory essay reveals the importance, relevance, and rich rewards of these little-known works. Baldwin's many devotees will find much to celebrate in these pages. Edited by Kerouac himself, *Blues* is an exuberant foray into language and consciousness, rich with imagery, propelled by rhythm, and based in a reverent attentiveness to the moment. "In my system, the form of blues choruses is limited by the small page of the breastpocket notebook which they are written, like the form of a set number of bars in a blues chorus, and so sometimes the word-meaning can carry from one chorus into another, or not, just like the phrase-meaning can carry harmonically from one chorus to the other, or not, in jazz. That, in these blues as in jazz, the form is determined by time, by the musicians spontaneous phrasing & harmonizing with the beat, time as it waves & waves on by in measured choruses." —Jack Kerouac
